## THE LIBRARY AND CFOL RESPOND TO THE CAMP FIRE

PARADISE LIBRARY

The Paradise Library withstood the flames, but it is not in good shape. The library on Clark Road is closed indefinitely, while Butte County and library leaders decide how to handle the heavy smoke damage to walls, flooring and of course the precious books and historical documents. Environmental testing will have to be done to make sure everything is safe to touch.

Chico Branch Librarian Cynthia Pustejovsky says that the Butte County Library system hopes to have staff back and reopen the library in late spring. Paradise Library workers should hear soon on the steps for cleanup. In the meantime, workers have been placed at other libraries around the county, which seems to be going well.

All the books checked out at the time of the November 8th, 2018 fire will be considered burned, as so many of the homes they were in were destroyed.

Chico Friends of the Library has given \$200 Visa gift cards to 9 Chico and Paradise staff members impacted by the fire, to assist them in any way they choose. CFOL board members are waiting to see what else the board can do in a bigger way to help the Paradise Library reopen. Over the last couple of months CFOL has donated hundreds and hundreds of books, mostly children's books, for fire evacuees. The books have been taken to Disaster Resource Centers and have been greatly appreciated (see also article below).

Our hearts go out to the fire victims and the CFOL Board members hope we can do much more to get Paradise's community meeting center and house for books open as soon as possible.



November and December were busy months for the library. Staff listened compassionately to Camp Fire evacuees and assisted them with a variety of tasks, from clearing lost library items from their accounts, and downloading/printing documents that the Disaster Center needed, to setting up email accounts for the first time. A Camp Fire information table was set-up with latest Wildfire Recovery information, change of address forms, handouts from various County agencies, B-Line schedules, and maps of Chico. Many families would visit for a couple of hours to give their children a break from the upheaval that they were experiencing.

In November, we had a very pleasant surprise when Recreate of Sacramento contacted the Chico branch about bringing their "More Art! Less Waste" program to the library for a day of maker activities for families. We quickly accepted the offer. They brought their own supplies and many terrific volunteers who worked with the children. It was a drop-in program from 10–3:30, with about 225 participating.

"Recreate is a nonprofit and is committed to reducing waste in our community—and inspiring others to do the same—through art, education, and imagination. ReCreate collects safe, clean, unbelievably cool—but unwanted—items from local businesses, diverting over 70 tons of material from landfill each year."
